To whom it may concern,

This letter expresses the strong support of Farm Renewables Consulting for Essential Energy's ring-fencing waiver application to establish a Training Academy in regional New South Wales, as outlined by the Australian Energy Regulator (AER) [Initiation Notice, AER, 6 August 2025].

Farm Renewables Consulting is an Australian-owned business, rooted in the heart of the Central West NSW. Director, Karin Stark is a recognised leader in the agriculture and clean energy space, holding a unique position living on a farming property on the edge of the country's first Renewable Energy Zone. She has strong networks in regional Australia and seeks to facilitate the adoption of on-farm renewables as a practical way to reduce costs and emissions while building resilience. I believe that the academy will support the transition to clean energy by preparing workers for jobs in solar, wind, and energy infrastructure projects. This will help attract investment to regional NSW and align with broader state and national goals for decarbonisation. By fostering a skilled, resilient community and supporting underrepresented groups, the academy promotes social inclusion and long-term regional development in line with government strategies.
