GPT Application for Exemption from the Requirement to Register as a Network Service Provider

1. Introduction

We act for GPT Funds Management Limited (GPT).

We are seeking, on behalf of GPT, an exemption under clause 2.5.1(d) of the National Electricity Rules (the *Rules*) from the requirement to register with NEMMCO as a Network Service Provider (*NSP*) in connection with the arrangements described in section 2 of this letter.

'Office buildings' is a class of network owner or operator covered by the general exemptions granted by the AER under clause 9 of the 'Guidelines for exemption from the requirement to register as a network service provider' (the *Guidelines*) which are issued under clause 2.5.1(e) of the Rules. GPT currently relies on this class of exemption in relation to the on-sale of electricity to its tenants in its commercial office building at 123 Eagle Street, Brisbane (the *Riverside Centre*).

However, this application for a specific exemption relates to circumstances whereby GPT has been asked to use its existing infrastructure to provide temporary construction power supply to an adjacent building site.

We have addressed each of the principles set out in the Guidelines in section 3 of this letter.

2. Background

This application relates to a request from Leighton Contractors Pty Ltd (*Leightons*) for GPT to provide a temporary construction power supply from the Riverside Centre to an adjacent building site, 111 Eagle Street (the *Site*) at which Leightons is constructing a new commercial office building.

GPT has had in place for some time now various electricity on-supply arrangements with its tenants in the Riverside Centre and is amenable to Leightons request for the following reasons:

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Bangkok Beijing Brisbane Hanoi Ho Chi Minh City Hong Kong Jakarta Melbourne Perth Phnom Penh Port Moresby Shanghai Singapore Sydney the Riverside Centre has the spare capacity and the Site can be connected relatively easily;

- the supply, being for the purposes of construction, is temporary in nature and will
 cease when Leightons complete the works or when a permanent power supply is
 made available to the Site; and
- the supply will avoid the use of diesel powered generation for the Site which is, without doubt, a more desirable environmental outcome.

3. Principles for Exemption

Clause 6 of the Guidelines provides that a number of principles will be applied to assess an application. We have addressed each of those principals here:

(a) Extent of network

Whilst the network is not wholly contained within the Riverside Centre the majority of it is contained within the premises and under the control of GPT. GPT also envisages obtaining a contractual licence from the owner of the Site to allow GPT to occupy the parts of the Site as necessary to provide the on-supply services.

(b) Incidental to the applicant's business

The provision of the network and the supply of electricity to Leightons is incidental to GPT's main business of funds management with the Riverside Centre being part of its diverse property investments.

(c) Standards/regulatory controls

The technical standards for the electrical installation which apply to the Riverside Centre are set out in the *Electricity Act 1994* (Qld) (the *Act*) and the *Electricity Regulation 2006* (the *Regulation*). We understand from our client that the network currently meets these standards.

(d) Access to NEM

Leighton's access to the National Electricity Market will not be restricted for the following reasons:

- GPT is responding in good faith to Leighton's request for supply;
- this is a short-term arrangement; and
- the proposed on-sale agreement (the *Agreement*) provides for a limited term and Leightons have the right to terminate the contract by notice to GPT.

(e) Network Charges

Due to the temporary nature of the supply GPT is not proposing to charge separately for the internal network. However, it will charge a connection fee to cover the reasonable costs of connection.

(f) Energy Charges

The on-suppliers exemption provisions under the Act set out the maximum amount that may be charged to a recipient under an on-selling regime. Under the proposed Agreement GPT will charge at Tariff 20 which complies with the Act.

(g) Dispute Resolution

It is proposed that the Agreement, which will set out the basis on which electricity is supplied by GPT to Leightons, will include a clause providing a mechanism for the resolution of any disputes.

(h) Jurisdictional Exemption

It is GPT's intention to rely on section 20A of the Act ('Exemptions for on-suppliers') which provides an exemption from sections 88A and 89 of the Act for electricity on-suppliers. The terms of the proposed Agreement are consistent with this approach. We note that whilst on-suppliers must comply with the exemption provisions no formal application is required.

We note that the AER is required by Rule 2.5.1(f) to consult with the Jurisdictional Regulator. For those purposes we are providing a copy of this application to the Queensland Regulator for its review ahead of that consultation.

4. Other Information For Consideration

Clause 11 of the Guidelines also requires other information which is set out below:

(a) Exemptions from other codes or regulations

No other specific exemptions have been sought by GPT.

(b) Nature of exemption sought

GPT is seeking an exemption from the requirement to register as an NSP not merely an exemption from chapter 5 of the Rules. However, we understand that if GPT is successful in gaining the registration exemption chapter 5 will not apply in any event.

(c) The network to be exempted

A diagram showing in broad terms the scope of the network is attached for your information.

(d) Discussions between the applicant and the NSP to which the relevant network will be connected

The network has been connected to Energex's distribution system for some years. GPT continues to liaise with Energex about the connection as required.

- (e) Arrangements for setting network charges for parties using the network Please refer to clause 3(e) above.
- (f) What arrangements are proposed for energy charges?
 Please refer to clause 3(f) above.

5. Timeframe

Leightons have requested that the temporary construction power supply be made available as soon as possible as this will alleviate the need to rely on diesel fuel and minimise delays to the construction programming.
