## Re: SSROC SUPPLEMENTARY SUBMISSION ON ENERGYAUSTRALIA'S PUBLIC LIGHTING PROPOSAL FOR 2009-14

This submission is a supplement to the 8 August and 15 August submissions made by SSROC on behalf of the 34 Councils in the SLI Program.

On 1 November, the AER released a further submission from EnergyAustralia (EnergyAustralia supplementary submission.pdf). This consisted of a letter and tabular response to some of the key concerns about public lighting pricing proposals that have been raised by local government.

In summary, EnergyAustralia has again declined to publicly substantiate the basis of its large proposed price increases by disclosing underlying modeling and cost information to customers. It is of real concern that the limited additional information provided by EnergyAustralia does not adequately address many of the key points raised in Council submissions to the AER.

This lack of adequate disclosure is particularly disappointing given the comments of George Maltabarow, CEO of EnergyAustralia, at the 30 July 2008 AER Forum in Sydney. In response to specific questions about the lack of disclosure in the initial EnergyAustralia submission, Mr Maltabarow said that, he "...cannot see why this information should not be made available, especially if it was available as part of the previous IPART determination<sup>1</sup>".

As SSROC noted in its submission to the AER of 15 August, EnergyAustralia provided a wide range of detailed pricing information to its customers in the last pricing reset in 2004/05 including detailed assumptions about capital costs, overheads, labour costs and labour productivity. None of this information has been made available to customers in this pricing review.

Without this vital information, Councils are unable to assess and meaningful comment on key concerns such as:

- Apparent substantial price premiums being sought for energy efficient public lighting including why price proposals appear inconsistent with a previous confidential costing report provided by EnergyAustralia, with pricing information provided directly to Councils by the suppliers of these types of lighting and with reasonable benchmarks at other DNSPs;
- 2) Whether EnergyAustralia's labour assumptions are appropriate particularly, for example, given the large number of replacements taking place under bulk luminaire replacement programs and given previous

large discrepancies in labour productivity assumptions between EnergyAustralia and the Victorian ESC pricing review in 2004; and

 The precise calculation approach used in EnergyAustralia's novel annuity basis of capital calculations and for proposed new rate structures.

Councils strongly welcomed the AER's 30 July comments about the importance of transparency. In this context, I reiterate that the Victorian ESC was able to stage a public pricing review process in 2004. Capital costs, consumables costs, assumed failure rates, labour costs and labour productivity were all presented and validated, and revised in an open process. There does not seem to be any reasonable barrier to similar levels of disclosure in NSW. Indeed, without it, the integrity of the AER's pricing review process is at risk of being severely undermined.

Full information disclosure for monopoly services should be at the core of the AER's pricing review process. Customers cannot have confidence in pricing decisions if the basis of the costs is not understood, particular when substantial increases are sought.

SSROC welcomes further discussion with the AER about the issue of disclosure as well as matters raised in previously submitted documents.
